## April 2023 Report to the Legislative Budget Oversight Commission

This report also contains information about the expenditure of federal financial relief by State and local governments related to the COVID-19 pandemic.

#### General Funds Revenue Revision

Weaker than expected year-to-date State individual income tax receipts and federal sources have led GOMB to revise the General Funds fiscal year 2023 revenue forecast downward. Details on the revision are included in the table below. These revisions take into account actual receipts through April 30, 2023. Other tables in this report use the prior forecast from February 2023 as a basis of comparison.

#### Fiscal Year 2023:

• Through April 2023, individual income taxes (IIT) have underperformed the fiscal year 2023 revenue estimate from February 2023 by approximately 1.8 percent. Withholding receipts are 1.4 percent above the same period of fiscal year 2022, reflecting a solid period of employment and strength in wages and salaries. Non-withholding receipts are 30.4 percent below the same period fiscal year 2022. Both components of non-withholding receipts, estimated and final payments, have contributed to these results and not expected to be made up over the remaining two months. Income derived from investments on state funds have overperformed estimates due to high interest rates and cash availability. The forecast for federal revenues and cigarette taxes have been lowered to account for receipts year-to-date.

#### Fiscal Year 2024:

• The revision to fiscal year 2023 revenue estimate has necessitated a reevaluation of the fiscal year 2024 revenue estimate. Investment income, federal revenues and cigarette taxes have been adjusted to account for a change in the base. Given that the underperformance in the April 2023 receipts for non-withholding can be linked to external factors that are not expected to change before April 2024, a review of that forecast is warranted. Typically, this would result in a downward revision for IIT, however, as part of an annual statutory reconciliation of prior year business tax payments a noticeable reallocation in fund distributions will take place in fiscal year 2024. This reallocation will result in a significant amount of revenues flowing through individual income tax disbursements instead of corporate income taxes, some of which will be one-time in nature.

#### Expenditures of Federal Financial Relief Related to COVID-19

In 2020 and 2021, Congress enacted six pieces of legislation to address the impact of COVID-19:

- 1) Coronavirus Preparedness and Response Supplemental Appropriations Act, 2020 Enacted March 6, 2020
- 2) Families First Coronavirus Response Act (FFCRA) Enacted March 18, 2020
- 3) Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security (CARES) Act Enacted March 27, 2020
- 4) Paycheck Protection Program and Health Care Enhancement Act Enacted April 24, 2020
- 5) Coronavirus Response and Relief Supplemental Appropriations Act (CRRSA) Enacted December 27, 2020
- 6) American Rescue Plan Act of 2021 (ARPA) Enacted March 11, 2021

According to estimates from Federal Funds Information for States (FFIS), through these six laws approximately \$52 billion is expected to be directed to Illinois state and local governments (including counties, cities, universities and mass transit districts) and healthcare providers to address COVID-19 response needs. This amount does not include federal assistance programs such as stimulus checks to households, unemployment insurance assistance for individuals, and the Paycheck Protection Program for small businesses.

A large sum of direct aid came to Illinois through a provision in the CARES Act which created the Coronavirus Relief Fund (CRF) for state and local governments. Illinois' share after direct allocations to local governments was \$3.519 billion to cover the state's necessary incurred expenditures in response to COVID-19 between March 1, 2020, and December 30, 2021. Funds were used for agency operational response costs, grants to healthcare providers, rental assistance, grants to small businesses and childcare providers, and grants to local governments.

In March 2021, the American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) became law. This \$1.9 trillion economic stimulus bill included direct payments to individuals, an extension of enhanced unemployment compensation benefits, direct state and local aid, and several other programs and program modifications to facilitate the nation's recovery from the pandemic.

Some of the larger ARPA allocations included:

- Coronavirus State Fiscal Recovery Fund: \$8.1 billion primarily for COVID-19 related expenditures and to replace revenue lost as a result of the pandemic. Funds may be used for expenses obligated through December 31, 2024 (and fully expended by December 31, 2026). An additional \$254 million is expected to come to Illinois from the Coronavirus Capital Projects Fund to be used for Connect Illinois broadband projects.
- Local Fiscal Recovery Fund: \$6.0 billion. Most of these funds will go directly to large cities (estimated \$2.7 billion) and counties (estimated \$2.5 billion). Approximately \$740 million will flow through the state treasury to smaller ("non-entitlement") cities the first half of which was distributed by the state in fall 2021.
- Education: \$6.4 billion. Includes \$5.05 billion for public K-12 schools (through Elementary and Secondary Emergency Relief (ESSER) Fund), \$1.3 billion for institutions of higher education (Higher Education Emergency Relief Fund (HEERF), and \$80 million for private K-12 schools. This is in addition to amounts received from previous legislation for ESSER and HEERF funding.

The fiscal year 2022 budget directed federal dollars received from ARPA to aid businesses and families and invest in Illinois' communities. In addition to dollars for specific programming purposes, ARPA allocated \$8.381 billion to Illinois through the Coronavirus State Fiscal Recovery Fund and the Coronavirus Capital Projects Fund, which will allow the State to make targeted investments with accelerated impact. The fiscal year 2022 budget enacted in June 2021 allocated roughly \$2.8 billion from the Coronavirus State Fiscal Recovery Fund dollars to key areas like infrastructure, violence prevention, education, healthcare, affordable housing, and economic recovery and reserved \$1.5 billion to replace lost revenues to the state, due to the pandemic, to fund essential government services as allowed under ARPA. In April 2022, the remainder of the \$8.381 billion was allocated, including the \$2.7 billion deposited to the Unemployment Trust Fund (PA 102-0696) and \$1.37 billion to a number of agencies for COVID-19 related response. The \$1.37 billion includes support for healthcare providers, funding for grants through the Reimagine Public Safety Act, violence prevention and interruption grants, funding for affordable housing, several new programs to support industries impacted by the COVID-19 Pandemic, and other purposes.

## Continued - Expenditures of Federal Financial Relief Related to COVID-19

The following tables detail allocations and spending from the federal bills enacted for COVID-19 relief. These tables illustrate expenditures from fiscal year 2021 or fiscal year 2022 appropriations compared to the federal award amount. In several appropriations, amounts for the enhanced federal awards are combined with other programmatic appropriations and will not directly line up with the COVID-19 response award amount.

### **Current Budget Management Actions**

Hiring Freeze: Effective April 6, 2020, all non-essential hiring was frozen until further notice.

**Travel Restrictions:** Effective March 13, 2020, all forms of travel that are not mission essential to the operations of a state agency were cancelled or put on hold indefinitely.

Municipal Liquidity Facility Borrowing: In order to maintain adequate cash flow in spite of significant declines in state revenue sources related to the pandemic, GOMB executed two separate borrowing transactions through the Federal Municipal Liquidity Facility program. The first borrowing was executed in June of 2020, totaling \$1.2 billion. Repayment of this borrowing was completed in fiscal year 2021. The second borrowing was executed in December 2020, totaling \$2.0 billion. Repayment of this borrowing was completed in January 2022, nearly two full years early.

### Appendix B - Legislative Budget Oversight Commission Legislation Related to this Report

(25 ILCS 10/20)

Sec. 20. Legislative Budget Oversight Commission.

- (a) The General Assembly hereby finds and declares that the State is confronted with an unprecedented fiscal crisis. In light of this crisis, and the challenges it presents for the budgeting process, the General Assembly hereby establishes the Legislative Budget Oversight Commission. The purpose of the Commission is: to monitor budget management actions taken by the Office of the Governor or Governor's Office of Management and Budget; to oversee the distribution and expenditure of federal financial relief for State and local governments related to the COVID-19 pandemic; and to advise and review planned expenditures of State and federal grants for broadband projects.
- (b) At the request of the Commission, units of local governments and State agency directors or their respective designees shall report to the Commission on the status and distribution of federal CARES money and any other federal financial relief related to the COVID-19 pandemic.
- (c) In anticipation of constantly changing and unpredictable economic circumstances, the Commission will provide a means for the Governor's Office and the General Assembly to maintain open communication about necessary budget management actions during these unprecedented times. Beginning August 15, 2020, the Governor's Office of Management and Budget shall submit a monthly written report to the Commission reporting any budget management actions taken by the Office of the Governor, Governor's Office of Management and Budget, or any State agency. At the call of one of the cochairs, the Governor or his or her designee shall give a report to the Commission and each member thereof. The report shall be given either in person or by telephonic or videoconferencing means. The report shall include:
  - (1) any budget management actions taken by the Office of the Governor, Governor's Office of Management and Budget, or any agency or board under the Office of the Governor in the prior quarter.
    - (2) year-to-date general funds revenues as compared to anticipated revenues;
    - (3) year-to-date general funds expenditures as compared to the Fiscal Year 2021 budget as enacted;
  - (4) a list, by program, of the number of grants awarded, the aggregate amount of such grant awards, and the aggregate amount of awards actually paid with respect to all grants awarded from federal funds from the Coronavirus Relief Fund in accordance with Section 5001 of the federal Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security (CARES) Act or from the Coronavirus State Fiscal Recovery Fund in accordance with Section 9901 of the federal American Rescue Plan Act of 2021, which shall identify the number of grants awarded, the aggregate amount of such grant awards, and the aggregate amount of such awards actually paid to grantees located in or serving a disproportionately impacted area, as defined in the program from which the grant is awarded; and
    - (5) any additional items reasonably requested by the Commission.

[...]

- (d) The Legislative Budget Oversight Commission shall consist of the following members:
  - (1) 7 members of the House of Representatives appointed by the Speaker of the House of Representatives:
    - (2) 7 members of the Senate appointed by the Senate President;
  - (3) 4 members of the House of Representatives appointed by the Minority Leader of the House of Representatives; and
    - (4) 4 members of the Senate appointed by the Senate Minority Leader.
- (e) The Speaker of the House of Representatives and the Senate President shall each appoint one member of the Commission to serve as a co-chair. The members of the Commission shall serve without compensation.
  - (f) As used in this Section:

"Budget management action" means any fund transfer directed by the Governor or the Governor's Office of Management and Budget, designation of appropriation lines as reserve, or any other discretionary action taken with regard to the budget as enacted;

"State agency" means all officers, boards, commissions, departments, and agencies created by the Constitution, by law, by Executive Order, or by order of the Governor in the Executive Branch, other than the Offices of the Attorney General, Secretary of State, Comptroller, or Treasurer.

(g) This Section is repealed July 1, 2023.
